THE STORY BEHIND THE RED KETTLE

Back in 1891, Salvation Army Captain Joseph McFee resolved to provide a free Christmas dinner for San Francisco's many poor souls. He had one major hurdle to overcome: *How would he pay for the food?*

He lay awake nights, worrying and praying about how he would find the funds to fulfill his commitment to feeding the city's most destitute citizens. From his days as a sailor in England, the captain remembered a large pot, called a "Simpson's Pot," into which passersby would toss charitable donations.

The next day, Captain McFee placed a similar pot at Oakland Ferry Landing at the foot of Market Street in San Francisco. Beside the pot, he placed a sign that read, "Keep the Pot Boiling." He soon had the money to make sure people in need were properly fed at Christmas.

Captain Mc Fee's kettle idea launched a tradition that has spread not only throughout the United States, but all across the world.

Today, generous contributions to the kettles enable The Salvation Army to bring the spirit of Christmas to people who would otherwise be forgotten – to seniors who are lonely, people who are ill, inmates of jails and other institutions, and men, women, and families who are less fortunate.

Whenever you see the Red Kettles, let them remind you of the difference your contributions mean for people in need.

SALVATION ARMY TRIVIA

"DID YOU KNOW"

- The Red Shield dates back to 1896, and serves as the trademark for The Salvation Army's social services.
- The Salvation Army's first major forays into disaster relief resulted from the tragedies of the Galveston hurricane of 1900 and the San Francisco earthquake of 1906.
- Founded in 1865 as "The East London Christian Mission," the organization's name became The Salvation Army in 1878.
- "Strawberry Fields Forever," the 1964 song by The Beatles, is John Lennon's nostalgic reference to a Salvation Army orphanage called Strawberry Field in Woolton, England.
- The Christmas song, "Silver Bells," first sung by Bob Hope and Marilyn Maxwell in the movie, *The Lemon Drop Kid*, was inspired by the imagery of Salvation Army bell-ringers standing outside department stores every Christmas season.



Woodland Shelter - Year 3

Our Program:

The Woodland Shelter aims to assist Fourth & Hope by providing additional housing for homeless families and women during the winter, providing a safe and warm place to sleep.



Volunteers are essential to the program and there are many opportunities for participation. Just a few hours of time can make a big difference for the local homeless community!

Dates: Nightly, from January 6th through March 3, 2019

Location: St. Luke's Episcopal Church, 515 Second Street

The program will take place at St. Luke's for all 8 weeks, but is being hosted by various churches each week. Participants can sign up for any day they are available. A Fourth & Hope employee will be present at all shifts. Types of shifts include:

- *Morning/Evening Drivers - transport participants between Fourth & Hope and St. Luke's*
- *Evening Monitors - check in participants, interact with participants, set out snacks*
- *Overnight Monitors (volunteers can sleep) - assist Fourth & Hope employee if needed, assist getting participants ready to go in the morning*
- *Weekly shifts: activity hosts, snacks, cleaning, laundering sleeping bags*

Volunteer Positions

Thank you for your interest in volunteering with the Woodland Winter Shelter program! This program provides overflow overnight housing for homeless families and women during the cold months. There are a variety of shifts for volunteers to get involved at a level comfortable for them. Your support is crucial to providing this valuable service to our local community!

All shifts will take place at St. Luke's Episcopal Church (515 2nd Street, Woodland)

Daily Volunteer Shifts:

- Morning/Evening Drivers **must have valid Driver's License and insurance** - transport participants between Fourth & Hope and St. Luke's Episcopal Church (0.4 miles).
- Evening Monitors - assist Fourth & Hope staff member with check-in of participants at St. Luke's, set out snacks, interact with participants.
- Overnight Monitors - Stay at St. Luke's overnight to assist Fourth & Hope employee in the case of an emergency (volunteer can sleep).
- Activity Hosts - host an activity such as a craft, yoga night, movie, etc.
- Weekly Snacks - provide healthy snacks for participants (fruits, veggies, applesauce pouches, water, granola bars, jerky, etc.)
- Weekly Clean-up - help clean St. Luke's each week (sweep/mop floors, light cleaning and restocking of restrooms, light clean-up of kitchen)
- Weekly Laundering of sleeping bags (dates/times flexible) - take sleeping bags to laundromat for weekly cleaning.
- Facility Set-up (1/6/2019) - help set up St. Luke's space by setting out cots and sleeping bags, arranging tables and games, etc.
- Facility Clean-up (3/3/2019) - help clean up St. Luke's; bag up sleeping bags, sanitize and box up cots, sweep/mop floors, light cleaning of kitchen and restrooms.

Weekly Volunteer Coordinator

The Weekly Volunteer Coordinator (lead) will work closely with the Program Coordinator (Katie Churchill) for tasks related to the Winter Shelter Program for the week in which they are the lead. The primary responsibilities are outlined below.

*Note: although daily volunteers are encouraged and able to sign up any day they are available, different congregations and organizations are offering to "host" a week. That week would be the target week their members would sign up to volunteer, but there is **no obligation for the host congregation/organization to fill all slots for the week.** There will be volunteers from multiple congregations/organizations each week.*

- The Weekly Coordinator will be the point of contact with their congregation/organization to provide information about and promote the program, and will work to help members sign up for shifts on the online sign up calendar. ○ They will act as a liaison between the program and the congregation/organization
- The Weekly Coordinator will help the Program Coordinator to disseminate relevant information to volunteers for the week
- The Weekly Coordinator will keep the Program Coordinator informed of any program needs (supplies) or situations that arise
- The Weekly Coordinator will be the first one contacted if a volunteer is unable to make their shift that week
- The Weekly Coordinator will assist the Program Coordinator with potential locking/unlocking of the building and nightly check-ins
